What a glorious way to transition from winter to spring!!! Thirty-six brave travelers arrived at BWI at zero dark thirty on March 9th to travel north and west to Banff, Alberta, Canada. In total 46 members converged in Banff by the end of the day. The Banff region hosts three different ski areas, Sunshine Village, Lake Louise, and Norquay, being the smallest of the three.

The Canadian Rocky Mountains are more sharply chiseled than our more familiar western Rockies. The town of Banff is located at a sharp bend in the Bow River, and as a result, no matter which point of the compass you look, you are surrounded by glorious snow-covered mountains.

Interestingly, perhaps for the first time in club history, three generations of one family joined a club trip. John Hubbs and his family from Dallas were on the trip together - more on that later.



The trip was led by Mary Maxey and assisted by Priscilla Davis. For the pre-trip party at Mary's house, she prepared this nine-page "Who's Who" with 35 biographical sketches and photos. It's a very classy way to help travelers get to know each other.

Getting there and back

We gathered at BWI at 4 am!! A self-appointed temporary trip leader tried to start the group sign in. Mary arrived in time to sort it out for the 6:00 AM to Chicago on a smooth flight when most of us snoozed. Despite a long trek through three terminals to the international flights, we were on time for a 9:30 AM flight to Calgary; upon landing we had traveled through two time zones in 3 1/2 hours.

Clearing customs was easy at the kiosks. We boarded the Brewster Charter Bus Service to Banff on a comfortable 52 passenger coach. Those familiar from the Denver area remarked on how similar Calgary's sprawling suburbs looked. The bus driver shared his extensive knowledge of Alberta on the road. We had a 45-minute food and liquor stop on the way to Banff. The town is a charming village of 8300 residents (2021 census) at 4537' nestled in a narrow valley surrounded by picturesque mountains. The trip home also started early at 0 dark thirty on the bus. We cleared US customs in Calgary. In Chicago the two flights were across the concourse from each other for restful stop-over at Chicago O'Hare airport.

Lodging

We arrived at the Caribou Lodge in time for the 4pm check-in of small rooms with two queen beds and the usual amenities. The front desk was very helpful getting the family of five in adjacent rooms on the 2nd floor. The Keg Steakhouse restaurant is a full-service facility for breakfast and dinner at the hotel. The Red Earth Spa features a large hot pool and fitness room plus massages, etc. Complimentary Internet and coin operated washer/dryer are available. Ski lockers are provided in the garage.

Located on the east side of Banff Avenue are 17 hotels and lodges. Caribou is the second stop in line to pick up borders and skiers for the slopes; very convenient as the buses fill up quickly, but another bus is usually close behind.

Ski Areas

Most of the skiers spent their ski days at either Sunshine Village or Lake Louise. Sunshine Village is the higher of the two, mostly above the tree line, and straddles the Alberta/British Columbia border. Lake Louise Ski Resort is a bit lower, with more trees to provide shelter from the wind. The first three days were most definitely winter then on Wednesday the sun came out and brought on spring. The snow base was more than adequate, and it even snowed 5 cm (about two inches) on Sunday night.

Additionally, Jim Suh led 7 hard-core skiers on a side-trip to Kicking Horse, about two hours from Banff. Here are some statistics on the four ski areas: The area gets an annual snowfall of 360 inches.

Back in January, I wrote an article about skiing with a purpose about the opportunity for CSC members to join me in supporting Two Top Adaptive Sports Foundation. On February 26, Team Kathy-CSC Krewe participated in the fundraiser. The team had six members, three of whom, Colleen Prosser, Mary Maxey and I represented CSC. I also recruited two fellow instructors from TwoTop and a friend from Potomac Runners. We all had Columbia Ski Club bandannas, Two Top 100K t-shirts and smiles.

There were eight teams doing their best in pretty lousy snow conditions. However, despite the conditions, every-

one had a great time and over \$30,000 was raised including \$1,910 by Team Kathy-CSC Krewe. The pictures with this article include all the participants, Team Kathy-CSC Krewe, and the three CSC members. Mary Maxey was on the temporarily disabled list, so she stayed at the bottom of the slopes and checked in participants as they completed runs.

After we gave it our all to achieve as many runs as possible, the party ensued. There was a great lunch donated by Mission Barbeque and music outdoors. No regrets if you missed it. I have verbal commitments from all six team members to do it again next year and we'll gladly accept any new team members. For those who missed the first article Two Top winter sports are held at Whitetail Ski Resort. There is a core team of employees plus a small army of volunteers to teach alpine skiing/snowboarding. This includes: Two-track and/or snowboarding for those with mild deficits in their motor skills, Three-track for those who use one ski and outriggers, Four-Track for those who use two skis and outriggers and Sit-skis for those who require a wheelchair. Lessons are usually done with a minimum of two instructors per veteran with some requiring more assistance, particularly those in Sit-skis.

While major funding for Two Top comes from a grant from the US Veterans Administration, the grant doesn't cover everything, and has restrictions. All donations are tax deductible. Two Top Mountain Adaptive Sports Foundation is a 501(c) 3 organization and has been a chapter of "Move United" since 2008. If you or someone you know is a disabled veteran, become one of our Participants. Two Top makes every effort to work with any disability. The goal is to help everyone enjoy outdoor activities. Want to be a Ski Trip Leader in 2025?

The Columbia Ski Club is seeking leaders for 2025 ski trips. Applications are now being accepted for those interested in being either a Trip Leader (TL) or Assistant Trip Leader (ATL). Applications are due to the Ski Trip Coordinator by 4/12/2024. An information document is posted on the CSC website that provides detailed instructions on the application process, scoring criteria, and selection timeline. A Selection Committee of three senior Club members will rank the applications and conduct objective assignments based on the scoring criteria, past performance (if applicable), and best interests of the club.

All applicants must attend an in-person Orientation meeting on Sunday, 4/14/2024 from 1:30 - 4:00 p.m. A Zoom link will not be an option because the purpose of the meeting is an opportunity for potential leaders to interact. We will introduce candidates to the selection process, fundamental TL/ATL duties and expectations, and TL/ATL benefits such as discounts and lifts. Candidates will have an opportunity to meet other candidates with whom they may be working together as a TL/ATL pair, as well as members of the Selection Committee.

Serving as a TL or ATL is a challenging and rewarding experience and can be a lot of fun. We will have a significant training program for the 2025 leaders so that leaders will have the information and encouragement they need to succeed. This year's TL/ATL selection is one month earlier than usual to allow leaders and members to make informed decisions on early purchase of Epic and Ikon pass products.

Welcome to a new season of CSC Mini Golf, this summer marks the 13th year of our tour. Each summer we average forty plus people coming out to play a round or more; normally anywhere from eight to eighteen folks play per round.

It's a friendly competition; while we try our best on the course it's the fun and socializing that brings us out. No prior experience or skills are needed; once you see us play you'll know how true that is. You can play as many or as few rounds as you wish, just show up at the scheduled mini golf course. No RSVP's are required to play but for some post round venues we may need an RSVP to reserve enough seats for everyone.

Eighteen rounds are scheduled again this year through mid-September. Mid-week rounds are scheduled every three weeks at courses close to Columbia. One Sunday each month we do modest road trips to courses in Gaithersburg, Frederick, Annapolis, Reisterstown or Westminster. After each event the group goes out for food and drinks: our post round venues usually include wineries, micro-breweries, BBQ's, and seafood restaurants.

This summer the schedule has been switched a bit, we'll play the Mitchell course in April to avoid the summer heat and go to Gaithersburg in June for a change. For our Wednesday rounds, we play each local course twice.

Upcoming round announcements, as well as any weather related postponement info, will be sent out on mts emails, posted on the CSC Mini Golf web page, the CSC Facebook page and Meetup. Should a round be postponed due to weather, we typically reschedule on the same day one week later. Hope to see you on the mini links this year!
