The Getaways and Adventures bus trip to Mackinac Island, MI scheduled for June 2024 has an exciting enhancement! Our entire group will be staying (3) nights at the premier **Grand Hotel** on Mackinac Island at **NO** additional cost to trip participants. Staying at the historic **Grand Hotel**, an iconic summer destination since 1887, is certainly the best way to experience the allure of the Island. Since first announcing the trip in August, we've also fi-

nalized many of the trip details including our stops and sight-seeing excursions.

After departing the Columbia area on June 2, we'll travel by bus approximately 2.5 hours for our first stop at the Flight 93 National Memorial in Shanksville, PA. Even if you've previously been to this national memorial to the 9-11 heroes of Flight 93, you've likely not experienced the newest additions to the memorial site. The completed Visitor Center offers multi-media and interactive exhibits that put the tragic events into context. The Memorial Plaza provides a moving tribute to the 40 people who perished as they brought the plane down, while the grounds surrounding the Plaza offer walking trails where you can gain an overview of the crash site and memorial. Most impressive is the recently opened Tower of Voices, a 93-foot-tall musical tower containing wind chimes as a living memorial to those whose voices were silenced on that day.

Our trip will continue along the PA Turnpike for approximately 3 hours before stopping to enjoy dinner and a good night's rest a local hotel near Cleveland, OH.

The 2nd day of the trip, we'll travel approximately 2.5 hours to Dearborn, Michigan, for a stop at the Henry Ford Museum of American Innovation. This museum showcases advances in transportation, historical events, and great American inventors, thinkers, and trailblazers, such as the Wright Brothers, Thomas Edison, Rosa Parks, Buckminster Fuller, and many more.

Our travel will then continue through northern Michigan next arriving in Mackinac City where we'll leave our bus to board the hydroplane ferry to Mackinac Island. Arriving on the Island, we'll be taken by horse and carriage to the historic **Grand Hotel** where you'll stay in one of the 388 uniquely decorated guestrooms and free to enjoy the many amenities of the **Grand** including the 660foot front porch (currently the longest in the world), elegant dining, the historic Ether Williams swimming pool, golf at "The Jewel", the lush spring garden, and

of course, shopping at "the shops of the Grand Hotel"!

Frequently trips to Mackinac Island ferry over for just a single day then return to the mainland for an overnight stay in Mackinac City. However, our tour includes 3 nights and 2 full days on Mackinac Island allowing you the opportunity to explore and take full advantage of the island's many sights and activities, or simply relax in the charming Victorian atmosphere of this unique and picturesque town, where no cars are allowed.

Once on Mackinac Island, our tour includes a narrated horse and carriage tour through downtown to Surry Hills, Arch Rock, Ft. Mackinac, and Mackinac Island State Park. With included carriage taxi service on the Island, it's easy to take in other sights, such as the Carriage Museum, Butterfly House and Insect World, the Manoogian Art Museum, Maze of Mirrors, Little Stone Church, Blacksmith Shop, and more. Alternatively, you can explore on your own by foot, by kayak, or by bike; everything on Mackinac Island is readily accessible. Golf, spa and massage services, sampling world-famous Mackinac Island fudge at one of several renowned downtown shops – there are many possibilities to fill your days. We will enjoy the Grand Luncheon Buffet at the world-famous Grand Hotel, overlooking the world's longest porch and the Straits of Mackinac. We'll embark for a Sip and Sail Sunset Cruise featuring live entertainment and picturesque sunsets.

Upon departing Mackinac Island, we'll re-board our bus for a 1-hour trip to Sault Ste. Marie, MI, where we'll visit the "Soo" locks, including a boat ride through the locks. You'll be able to experience first-hand how the locks have made the Great Lakes one of the world's busiest shipping channels, enabling transport of raw materials and consumer goods to and from the Atlantic Ocean to the Midwest.

We'll depart the Upper Peninsula, and we'll travel approximately 3.5 hours to the Germanstyle of Frankenmuth, Michigan, also known as "Little Bavaria". You'll be able to enjoy the festive atmosphere of this Bavarian village, along with its shops and restaurants, and visit Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, the largest Christmas shop in the world. Our stop will include dinner at Oma's Restaurant, famous for their traditional German and American Food. Our overnight accommodations will be near Toledo, OH, approximately a 2-hour drive from Frankenmuth.

On our final full day, we'll return home to Maryland! We'll be taking plenty of stops along the way for breaks and meals.



Howard County Food Bank


